The Lure of Ruins: Exhibition Architectural ruins have been a recognized subject in European and American art for more than four centuries. In many cases, the ruins portrayed in art serve to remind us about the power of nature and time and the parallel fragility of human life and civilization. They capture the pathos of destruction and feed our fascination with dystopian disasters. Organized as part of the 2018 Big Read project, The Lure of Ruins includes ten works of art ranging in date from the early 18th century to the early 21st century that illustrate different historical approaches to the depiction of ruins in art. "El Sueno Americano: The American Dream" by Tom Kiefer This series of photographic works by artist Tom Kiefer documents objects confiscated at the US/Mexico border. Kiefer, once a West Coast-based artist, left Los Angeles over 15 years to photograph the desert landscapes of Arizona, near the US/Mexico border. While there, he took a job as a janitor at the Customs and Border Protection Center in Why, Arizona. Over the course of a decade, he collected tens of thousands of items confiscated by Border Patrol agents and thrown in the trash. Items deemed unsafe or non-essential. Items like soaps, water bottles, Bibles, contraceptives, and children's toys. He began archiving and documenting these items, which he refers to as "sacred objects" in 2007. Isolated from context, the photos raise basic questions like, Whose things are these? Why so many? Where are their owners now? Why were they collected? Corridor Exhibit: "City of Lost Things" Works by Tori Pelz Inspired by working with Tom Kiefer on El Sueno, Tori has created a series of works that responds to his exhibition. The City of Lost Things is a series of fantastical mixed-media drawings that imagine a city populated by objects that have been separated from their owners. The series is an exploration of borderlands as liminal spaces in which intrinsic connections between objects, place and personhood are in flux and reimagined. Tori Pelz is an artist and educator whose multi-disciplinary practice often involves social engagement by promoting collaboration and creating visual platforms for personal, place-based narratives. Exploring themes such as hospitality, displacement and belonging, her work strives to take empowering forms and amplify the voices of those silenced. NEA BIG READ LAKESHORE is a Hope College program in collaboration with many partnering institutions and organizations including Herrick District Library, Howard Miller Public Library, Western Theological Seminary, Holland Museum, Ottawa Area Intermediate School District, City of Holland, Saugatuck Center for the Arts, Saugatuck-Douglas District Library, Loutit District Library, Fennville Library, Alliance for Cultural and Ethnic Harmony, CultureWorks, Holland Area Arts Council, Ready for School. Partial funding for our program comes from the NEA Big Read, an initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) designed to revitalize the role of literary reading in American popular culture.

OUR PURPOSE: NEA Big Read Lakeshore seeks to create and foster a culture where reading matters. We strive to bring our community together around one book and use this shared experience of reading, discussing, and exploring the themes of the book as a springboard to learn from and listen to each other. A great book combines enrichment with enchantment. It awakens our imagination and enlarges our humanity. It can offer harrowing insights that somehow console and comfort us.

OUR PRACTICE: We actively work to offer a wide variety of programming that will appeal to a diverse population. Events take place □in a variety of spaces and locations. In addition, we actively collaborate□ with area middle/high schools, and the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District, engaging students in the larger conversations of our community. We also provide participating schools with a unique opportunity to interact with a world-renowned author. Our main events are planned to engage each book and its topics from a variety of perspectives, experiences, and angles, including not only lectures by engaging speakers, but also featuring film, food, music and art to explore and celebrate the topics under discussion. Through conversation, food, film, music, and art, our community will come together to explore the history and significance behind this story of identity, family, and the idea of home.

OUR PAST: Our first year, we read *To Kill a Mockingbird* by Harper Lee. Over 3,000 people participated in the 7 main events and the 38 public and private book discussions. In that first year 6 schools, and 8 teachers participated. In 2015, we focused on Tim O'Brien's *The Things They Carried*. Over 7000 people attended 10 main events and took part in 49 public and private book discussions. The project culminated in a visit from author Tim O'Brien, who delivered the keynote address to a standing-room-only community event. In 2016, we read *Brother*, *I'm Dying*, by Edwidge Danticat and had 10,000 participants in our programming and together explored issues of identity, immigration, and family. 2017 brought us Julie Otsuka's *When the Emperor Was Divine* and discussions about allegiance, American identity and traditions. 1,000 people attended our student exhibition of learning event.
